### Overview

This year marks the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of APEC and the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Bogor Goals. China is a significant partner to regional economic development and cooperation. As host of APEC meetings for 2014, China is committed to "Shaping the Future through Asia Pacific Partnership", which will be promoted through work under three priorities "Advancing Regional Economic Integration," "Promoting Innovative Development, Economic Reform and Growth" and "Strengthening Comprehensive Connectivity and Infrastructure Development."

As a champion of regional economic cooperation and a founding partner, PECC has an important role to play in helping the APEC policy making process by providing intellectual support. PECC has been not only working on the agenda items of regional economic cooperation for 2014 but also thinking big of the future of regional economic cooperation and integration, on the basis of profound understanding of the mandate of APEC and that of PECC per se.

The PECC 22<sup>nd</sup> General Meeting will be held about two months prior to the APEC Economic Leaders Meeting. This will provide a unique opportunity for PECC members to provide intellectual input into this year's APEC process and beyond. It is also a good opportunity to look at China's economic development and its economic policy orientation.
