The Institute of International Affairs (IIA) invited Chung-in Moon; a Distinguished University Professor of Yonsei University, and Duk-Min Yun; a Chair-Professor of Hankuk University of Foreign Studies, as guest speakers in the seminar.

The seminar began with a short presentation by both guest speakers regarding the issue of North Korean Nu-

clear Weapons and ROK-US alliance. It was followed by a debate session with Cheol-Hee Park; the Head of the Institute of International Affairs. The distinguished guests were able to express their opinion regarding the following questions; will it be possible for North Korea to fully give up on their nuclear weapons? What is the strategic significance of denuclearization of the Yongbyon Nuclear Facilities? How should the increased pressure campaign of the US be evaluated? The seminar ended with a Q & A session with the public and the concluding remarks of the speakers.

GSIS Students' Opinion about Online Lectures

1st Semester International Area Studies Major In my opinion, online courses have multiple advantages that benefit both the professors and students. The flexibility of time and space gave me the convenience to balance family and work commitments along with education. My colleagues that lived off-campus especially appreciated not having to commute each day to attend classes. Specific benefits from having courses on Zoom relate to the speed of lectures. Professors took their time explaining each material and confirming whether they were audible throughout the lecture. This gave me the time to recollect my thoughts and organize my notes. Additionally, the Zoom platform provided names of professors and each student within the class. As a freshman new to the school, this function helped me interact fluently with professors and students. At the end of the course, I remembered all the names and comments of my peers that I interacted with on Zoom.

Taking classes online had its disadvantages as well. I experienced multiple technological issues especially with the audio system on Zoom. There were cases where I was unable to clearly hear the professor or students and not having enough time to revisit my questions. Professors and students had to repeat their sentences and explanations due to this problem. This particular issue gave limitations to class discussions or presenting concerns regarding assignments. These technological issues and time limitations during LIVE sessions were the critical drawbacks of online lectures.

I believe utilizing LIVE and recorded lectures would solve the overall issues mentioned above. Dividing and balancing these two methods would give students the time to revisit and review recorded lectures and prepare questions for the LIVE discussion and debate section. This would particularly decrease technological issues.

Never had I expected that all classes would have been replaced to online structures, until the unexpected global pandemic strike. Not being used to taking classes outside the real class, at first I had a strong doubt on the fluent progress of the lectures. However, it was more than I had expected; both the faculty and the school administration had prepared a lot for organizing the classes, and so did the students. 
Merchandise




2020 Fall Semester Student Council Online Elections
