# **Course Description**

This seminar provides an intensive study of contemporary South Korea-Southeast Asia relations in economic, security, and cultural domains. In doing so, it pays great attention to how general theories of international relations, political economy, and development studies can be fruitfully applied to the study of the interactions between South Korea and Southeast Asia. Equally importantly, this course is also designed to equip students with abilities to work seriously with both qualitative and quantitative data while informed by historical understanding of these relationships. Students will be asked to gather, describe, and analyze data to gain insights on Korea-Southeast Asia relations.

- 4. Research paper: Students will write a research paper on the topics related to Korea-Southeast Asia. Detailed instructions will be provided. At the end of the semester, students will present their research at a "mini-conference."
- 5. Mini-Conference performance: Students will also perform the role of a moderator and a discussant for fellow students. Detailed instructions will be provided.
