## **Course Description & Objectives**

This course is designed to survey theories, history, and contending issues related to Korea-Japan relations. We deal with contemporary Korea-Japan relations after 1945, reviewing perspectives surrounding bilateral ties between the two countries. The topics we cover range from historical development of the bilateral relations, and how internal/external structure as well as normative factors such as perceptions and national identities shape and alter the relationship between the two countries. Each class session consists of short lecture, summary presentations, and discussion.

This paper should be "critical" and "analytical" research paper with strong supporting evidence and **proper academic citations**. Plagiarism will result in immediate zero point for this assignment.
