## III. Academic Requirements

## A. Requirements for Graduation

## [Ph.D. Program]

A minimum of 45 credits is required for graduation.
(1) Students must take one research method course (Those who have already taken a methodology course in their Master's program are exempted).
(2) Students should take 4 courses (12 credits) or more from their major program (International Commerce, International Cooperation, International Development, International Area Studies, and Korean Studies)
(3) Students should take 3 courses ( 9 credits) or more from other major programs (International Commerce, International Cooperation, International Development, International Area Studies, and Korean Studies)
(4) Students should take at least 8 elective courses ( 24 credits), including "Dissertation Research" (Students taking methodology course should take at least 7 elective courses (21 credits) or more)

* "Dissertation Research" is not mandatory for students in the doctorate program. However, students may take the course up to 4 times (a maximum of 12 credits, one course per semester) and have it counted as credits required for graduation.
(5) In any case, a student must take more than half of the minimum required credits from GSIS in order to fulfill SNU GSIS graduation requirements. Please refer to [GSIS Credit Acceptance/Requirement policy] stated in the SNU GSIS (Regulation \& Form) page for more details.


## [Master's Program]

A minimum of 39 credits is required for graduation. GPA of 3.0 or higher out of 4.3 is required.

1) Students should take the " 4 required courses" from the major program.
2) Students should take at least 3 courses ( 9 credits) in their GSIS major program.

* You can choose major courses from other majors that are mutually recognized majors. (Refer to Mutual Recognition List)

3) Students must take courses (credits) to fulfill required credits ( 39 credits) to be eligible to graduate.
4) Students must take at least 3 courses ( 9 credits) from practical courses in their major or elective program.
5) Students can take undergraduate courses within 6 credits. Students should seek advice from their advisory professor first, and then obtain approval from academic associate dean and program chair of his or her major before registering for undergraduate courses.
6) Credits earned from other graduate schools(including graduate schools in SNU, domestic exchange universities, etc) are accepted up to 9 credits, including 6 credits from undergraduate programs. Students should seek advice from their advisory professor first, and then obtain approval from academic associate dean and program chair of his or her major before registering for other graduate school courses.
7) In any case, a student must take more than half of the minimum required credits from GSIS in order to fulfill SNU GSIS graduation requirements. Please refer to [GSIS Credit Acceptance/Requirement policy] stated in the SNU GSIS (Regulation \& Form) page for more details.

- Students who earn at least 3 credits in foreign language courses and receive a BO or higher, may be exempted from taking the language test on their qualifying examinations. (Note: Students who take foreign language courses during their study abroad programs may be exempted from taking the test on their qualifying examinations, but will not be allowed to transfer their credits for those courses.)
- Students who have passed SNULT Level 3 or higher are exempt from the second foreign language requirement.
- Students who take courses in 'French (104.811)' or 'German (105.811)' and receive a Cor higher, are exempted from taking the respective language tests on their qualifying examinations.
- To meet the Korean language requirement, international students must score sixty points (60) for master's program, seventy points (70) for doctoral program, or higher on the Korean language test. However, students who had received an "S" in their "Korean language and Culture 1 (Course No: 990.804)" or "Korean Language and Culture 2 (Course No: 990.805)" are exempted from taking the Korean language test.
- Korean Examination: Students can take Korean written examination (Students who fail the written examination more than once can substitute by taking an oral examination).
- Students of Development Cooperation Policy Program(DCPP) can select Korean
language for their qualifying examinations.
- English speakers include students who use English as an official language.
- Student can take the Language courses for the qualifying examination but it will not be included in official credits for graduation.
- Students may submit language test score (taken within the last two years) to meet their foreign language requirement. Language tests recognized by GSIS are indicated below.

- Frequency of Application: Candidates are not allowed to apply for thesis qualifying exam more than 4 times. Candidates can apply for 3 sections at a time.
- Application Period: Within 8 semesters after enrolling (excluding leave of absence)
- Students must score seventy points (70) or higher on the each course test.
